

Redistricting Timeline

Date	Action
August 12, 2021	Release of official 2020 Census data
September 20, 2021	Release of California official redistricting data
September 21, 2021	Public Hearing #1 to solicit input on "communities of interest"
November 3, 2021	Public Workshop to demo mapping tools
December 7, 2021 7:15 PM	Public Hearing #2 to discuss draft maps
February 15, 2022 7:15 PM	Public Hearing #3 to review map revisions
April 5, 2022 7:15 PM	Public Hearing #4 to adopt final map
April 17, 2022	Legal deadline to adopt new map (E-205)
November 8, 2022	First election with new map



Legal Requirements & Other Goals

1. Federal Law

- ✓ Ensure equal population
- ✓ Comply with federal Voting Rights Act
- ✓ Prevent racial gerrymandering

2. California Law

- 1. Ensure geographic contiguity
- Minimize division of neighborhoods & "communities of interest"
- 3. Create easily identifiable boundaries
- 4. Maintain compactness
- ✓ Do not "favor or discriminate against a political party"

3. Other Goals

- Minimize changes to election cycles
- Respect voters' choices
- Preserve core
 of existing
 districts

Do not bypass a nearby population to take in a more distant population



Beyond Neighborhoods: Defining "Communities of Interest"

Under California Elections Code, "community of interest" has a very specific definition in the context of redistricting:



A "community of interest" is a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included <u>within a single district</u> for purposes of its effective and fair representation.



Definitions of "communities of interest" do **not** include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.

*Ideal Population: Each district must contain about 38,441 people

Population Balance Math

Ideal district size = 38,441

- Calculated by dividing total population by the number of districts
- **230,646/6 = 38,441**

Total deviation = 4,082


- Calculated by subtracting the smallest district's population from the largest district's population
- D6 (40,683) D3 (36,601) = 4,082

Total deviation % = 10.62%

- Calculated by the dividing the total deviation by the ideal district size
- **4,**082/38,441 = 10.62%

The Redistricting Process

Every 10 years, local governments use new data from the Census to redraw their district lines to reflect how local populations have changed. State law requires cities and counties to engage communities in the redistricting process by holding public hearings and doing public outreach, including to underrepresented and non-English-speaking communities. The City of Fremont is asking for your help to plan, draw, and redivide new City districts.

The finalized maps that you will help us create will define the six City of Fremont district borders, and these new districts will impact how you elect your Council Members for the next 10 years.

Our primary goal when developing election districts is to draw lines that respect neighborhoods, history and geographical elements. So we want to know: What do you consider the boundaries of your neighborhood?
